AN ACT making appropriations for the support of government

CAPITAL PROJECTS BUDGET

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1 Section 1. a) The several amounts specified in this chapter for capital projects, or so much thereof as shall be necessary to accomplish the purpose of the appropriations, are appropriated by comprehensive construction programs (hereinafter referred to by the abbreviation CCP), purposes, and projects designated by the appropriations, and authorized to be made available as hereinafter provided to the respective public officers; such appropriations shall be deemed to provide all costs necessary and pertinent to accomplish the intent of the appropriations and are appropriated in accordance with the provisions of section 93 of the state finance law.

11 b) Any amounts specified in this chapter for advances for capital projects, or so much thereof as shall be necessary to accomplish the purpose of the appropriations, are appropriated by comprehensive construction programs (hereinafter referred to by the abbreviation CCP), purposes and projects designated by the appropriations as advances from the capital projects fund in accordance with the provisions of sections 40-a and 93 of the state finance law, and are authorized to be paid as hereinafter provided as an advance for a share, part or whole of the cost for such programs, purposes and projects hereinafter specified.

20 c) The several amounts specified in this chapter as capital projects - reappropriations, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to accomplish the purpose of the appropriations, as appropriated by comprehensive construction programs (hereinafter referred to by the abbreviation CCP), purposes, and projects, being the undisbursed and/or unexpended balances of the prior year's appropriations, are reappropriated and unless otherwise amended or repealed in part or total in this chapter shall continue to be available for the same purposes as the prior appropriations or as otherwise amended for the fiscal year beginning April 1, 2021.

30 The capital projects reappropriations contained in this chapter may be amended by repealing the items set forth in brackets and by adding thereto the underscored material. Certain reappropriations in this chapter are shown using abbreviated text, with three leader dots (an ellipsis) followed by three spaces (...) used to indicate where existing law that is being continued is not shown. However, unless a change is clearly indicated by the use of brackets [] for deletions and underscores

EXPLANATION--Matter in italics (underscored) is new; matter in brackets [] is old law to be omitted.

1 for additions, the purpose, amounts, funding source and all other
2 aspects pertinent to each item of appropriation shall be as last appro-
3 priated.

4 For the purpose of complying with section 25 of the state finance law,
5 the year, chapter and section of the last act reappropriating a former
6 original appropriation or any part thereof is, unless otherwise indi-
7 cated, chapter 54, section 1, of the laws of 2020.

8 d) No moneys appropriated by this chapter shall be available for
9 payment until a certificate of approval has been issued by the director
10 of the budget, who shall file such certificate with the department of
11 audit and control, the chairperson of the senate finance committee and
12 the chairperson of the assembly ways and means committee.

13 e) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, prior to the
14 expenditure of any funds received by the Federal government in response
15 to the COVID-19 public health emergency pursuant to the authority grant-
16 ed in any appropriation set forth herein, the director of the budget may
17 require that the agency or public authority making such expenditures
18 submit an allocation plan to the director of the budget for approval.
19 Approved allocation plans shall be provided to the president pro tempore
20 of the senate and the speaker of the assembly within 30 days of
21 approval. Such allocation plan must comport with any minimum Federal
22 requirements for the expenditure of such funds.

23 f) Notwithstanding any provision contained herein or any other law to
24 the contrary, the budget director may withhold all or some of the
25 amounts appropriated herein, including amounts that are to be paid on
26 specific dates prescribed in law or regulation, from any local
27 government entity which has a police agency operating with police
28 officers as defined under 1.20 of the criminal procedure law who, by
29 April 1, 2021, fails to submit to the budget director the certification
30 required by Executive Order 203 issued on June 12, 2020 and titled "New
31 York State Police Reform and Reinvention Collaborative". The Director of
32 the Budget shall discontinue any withholds made pursuant to this
33 provision upon receipt of the certification required by Executive Order
34 203. To the extent the State is obligated to make payment to any local
35 government entity which has a police agency operating with police
36 officers as defined under 1.20 of the criminal procedure law pursuant to
37 any appropriation contained herein, such obligation shall be reduced
38 commensurate with the amount of payments withheld for the amount of time
39 such payments are withheld by the director of the budget pursuant to
40 this provision.

41 g) The appropriations contained in this chapter shall be available for
42 the fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2021 except as otherwise noted.
