AN ACT making appropriations for the support of government

AID TO LOCALITIES BUDGET

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1 Section 1. a) The several amounts specified in this chapter for aid to
2 localities, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to accomplish the
3 purposes designated by the appropriations, are hereby appropriated and
4 authorized to be paid as hereinafter provided, to the respective public
5 officers and for the several purposes specified.

6 b) Where applicable, appropriations made by this chapter for expendi-
7 tures from federal grants for aid to localities may be
8 allocated for spending from federal grants for any grant period begin-
9 ning, during, or prior to, the state fiscal year beginning on April 1,
10 2021 except as otherwise noted.

11 c) The several amounts named herein, or so much thereof as shall be
12 sufficient to accomplish the purpose designated, being the undisbursed
13 and/or unexpended balances of the prior year's appropriations, are here-
14 by reappropriated from the same funds and made available for the same
15 purposes as the prior year's appropriations, unless herein amended, for
16 the fiscal year beginning April 1, 2021. Certain reappropriations in
17 this chapter are shown using abbreviated text, with three leader dots
18 (an ellipsis) followed by three spaces (...) used to indicate where
19 existing law that is being continued is not shown. However, unless a
20 change is clearly indicated by the use of brackets [] for deletions and
21 underscores for additions, the purposes, amounts, funding source and all
22 other aspects pertinent to each item of appropriation shall be as last
23 appropriated.

24 For the purpose of complying with the state finance law, the year,
25 chapter and section of the last act reappropriating a former original
26 appropriation or any part thereof is, unless otherwise indicated, chap-
27 ter 53, section 1, of the laws of 2020 and, for the department of
28 health, chapter 50, section 3, of the laws of 2020.

29 d) No moneys appropriated by this chapter shall be available for
30 payment until a certificate of approval has been issued by the director
31 of the budget, who shall file such certificate with the department of
32 audit and control, the chairperson of the senate finance committee and
33 the chairperson of the assembly ways and means committee.

34 e) Notwithstanding any provision contained herein or any other law to
35 the contrary, if, during the 2021-22 fiscal year, the budget is deemed
36 unbalanced, the budget director shall withhold all or some of the
37 amounts appropriated herein, including amounts that are to be paid on

1 specific dates prescribed in law or regulation, in an amount equal to
2 such imbalance. Such withholds shall be done uniformly across-the-board
3 to the extent practicable or by specific appropriations as needed. The
4 following types of appropriations shall be exempt from withholds made
5 pursuant to this provision: (a) public assistance payments for families
6 and individuals and payments for eligible aged, blind and disabled
7 persons related to supplemental social security; (b) any reductions that
8 would violate federal law; (c) payments of debt service and related
9 expenses for which the state is constitutionally obligated to pay debt
10 service or is contractually obligated to pay debt service, subject to an
11 appropriation, including where the state has a contingent contractual
12 obligation; (d) payments for school aid, and (e) payments the state is
13 obligated to make pursuant to court orders or judgments. To the extent
14 the State is obligated to make payment to any individual or entity
15 pursuant to any appropriation contained herein, such obligation shall be
16 reduced commensurate with the amount of payments withheld by the
17 director of the budget pursuant to this provision, and provided further
18 that none of the interest or notification requirements established in
19 Articles 11-A or 11-B of the State finance law shall be applicable in
20 the event of such reduction. For purposes of this provision, the budget
21 shall be deemed unbalanced in the event that, as of August 31, 2021, the
22 State receives less than \$3,000,000,000 in unrestricted federal aid
23 intended to compensate the State for the direct and indirect economic,
24 financial, and social effects of the COVID-19 pandemic or for any other
25 reason similar thereto. No later than five days prior to the beginning
26 of each month, the director of the budget shall provide notification of
27 payments that are expected to be withheld in such month pursuant to this
28 provision to the president pro tempore of the senate and the speaker of
29 the assembly. No later than seven days after month end, the director of
30 the budget shall provide notification of payments that have been
31 withheld pursuant to this provision to the president pro tempore of the
32 senate and the speaker of the assembly.

33 f) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, prior to the
34 expenditure of any funds received by the Federal government in response
35 to the COVID-19 public health emergency pursuant to the authority grant-
36 ed in any appropriation set forth herein, the director of the budget may
37 require that the agency or public authority making such expenditures
38 submit an allocation plan to the director of the budget for approval.
39 Approved allocation plans shall be provided to the president pro tempore
40 of the senate and the speaker of the assembly within 30 days of
41 approval. Such allocation plan must comport with any minimum Federal
42 requirements for the expenditure of such funds.

43 g) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, for purposes
44 of any appropriation made by this chapter which authorizes spending in
45 an amount net of refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments,
46 and/or disallowances, "refunds" shall mean funds received to the state
47 resulting from the overpayment of monies, "rebates" shall mean funds
48 received to the state resulting from a return of a full or partial
49 amount previously paid, as for goods or services, serving as a
50 reduction, discount or rebate to the original payment amount,
51 "reimbursements" shall mean funds received to the state as repayment in
52 an equivalent amount for goods or services, including but not limited to
53 personal service costs, incurred by the state in the first instance
54 being provided to a third party for their benefit and partially or in
55 full financed by such third party, "credit" shall mean monies made
56 available to the state that reduce the amount owed to a third party,
57 including but not limited to billing errors, rebates, and prior overpay-
58 ments, "repayment" shall mean the return of monies as pay back for
59 expenses incurred, and "disallowance" shall mean monies made available
60 to the state that were not allowed or accepted officially by the
61 intended recipient, based on a determination the payment is not accepta-
62 ble and/or valid. When the office of the state comptroller receives any
63 such refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments, and/or
64

1 disallowances, he or she shall credit the refunded, rebated, reimbursed,
2 credited, repaid, and disallowed amount back to the original appropri-
3 ation and reduce expenditures in the year which such credit is received
4 regardless of the timing of the initial expenditure.

5 h) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, if the
6 state or any agency thereof incurs any costs associated with administer-
7 ing the rent regulation program in accordance with subdivision (c) of
8 section 8 of chapter 576 of the laws of 1974, as amended, for a city
9 having a population of one million or more, the director of the budget
10 may direct any other state agency or agencies making payments to such
11 city, or any department, agency, or instrumentality thereof, to perma-
12 nently reduce the amount of any other payment or payments owed to such
13 city or any department, agency, or instrumentality thereof pursuant to
14 any appropriation set forth in this chapter. Provided however, that such
15 reduction shall be in an amount equal to the costs incurred by the state
16 or agency thereof in accordance with subdivision (c) of section 8 of
17 chapter 576 of the laws of 1974 and provided further that such direction
18 shall be made in writing by the director of the budget. If the director
19 of the budget makes such direction pursuant to the authority set forth
20 herein, the impacted city shall not make the payments required by subdivi-
21 sion (c) of section 8 of chapter 576 of the laws of 1974, as amended,
22 and the division of housing and community renewal shall notify such city
23 in writing of what payment or payments will be reduced and the amount of
24 such reduction. To the extent a city of one million or more or any
25 department, agency, or instrumentality thereof is entitled to any cash
26 disbursement authorized by any appropriation contained in this chapter,
27 such entitlement shall be reduced commensurate with reductions in
28 payments made in accordance with this part.

29 i) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, upon enact-
30 ment of this chapter of the laws of 2021 containing the aid to localiti-
31 ties budget bill for the state fiscal year 2021-2022, all appropriations
32 and reappropriations contained in chapter 53 of the laws of 2020, which
33 would otherwise lapse by operation of law on March 31, 2022 are hereby
34 repealed.

35 j) Notwithstanding any provision contained herein or any other law to
36 the contrary, the budget director may withhold all or some of the
37 amounts appropriated herein, including amounts that are to be paid on
38 specific dates prescribed in law or regulation, from any local
39 government entity which has a police agency operating with police
40 officers as defined under 1.20 of the criminal procedure law who, by
41 April 1, 2021, fails to submit to the budget director the certification
42 required by Executive Order 203 issued on June 12, 2020 and titled "New
43 York State Police Reform and Reinvention Collaborative". The Director of
44 the Budget shall discontinue any withholds made pursuant to this
45 provision upon receipt of the certification required by Executive Order
46 203. To the extent the State is obligated to make payment to any local
47 government entity which has a police agency operating with police
48 officers as defined under 1.20 of the criminal procedure law pursuant to
49 any appropriation contained herein, such obligation shall be reduced
50 commensurate with the amount of payments withheld for the amount of time
51 such payments are withheld by the director of the budget pursuant to
52 this provision.

53 k) The appropriations contained in this chapter shall be available for
54 the fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2021 except as otherwise noted.

57 children and family services will determine what is reasonable in
58 establishing the size of the sample and sub-sample for each
59 district. The office of children and family services shall notify
60 each social services district of the sample of children and/or cases
61 from the federal audit period that the social services district must

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1 review. Any child or case from the social services district that was
2 included in the federal sample will automatically be included in the
3 social services district's review sample and the determination made
4 at the federal review regarding that child or case will govern for

29 Social services districts shall be required to report to the office of
30 temporary and disability assistance on an annual basis, information,
31 as determined and requested by the office, related to services and
32 expenditures for which reimbursement is sought for providing tempo-
33 rary housing assistance to homeless individuals and families. Such
34 information shall be submitted electronically to the extent feasible
35 as determined by the office, and shall be used to evaluate expendi-

57 services federal health and human services fund, state operations or

61 of article 6 of the social services law. The funds shall be appor-

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1 tioned among the social services districts by the office according
 2 to an allocation plan developed by the office and submitted to the
 3 director of the budget for approval within 60 days of enactment of
 4 the budget. The funds allocated to a district under this appropri-
 5 ation in addition to any state block grant funds allocated to the
 6 district for child care services and any funds the district requests
 7 the office of temporary and disability assistance to transfer from

 43 services and approved by the director of the budget. Such amounts
 44 allocated to local social services districts shall hereinafter be
 45 referred to as the flexible fund for family services and shall be
 46 used for eligible services to eligible individuals under the State

36 The following remaining appropriations within the office of temporary

41 such funds may be increased or decreased by interchange with any

25 For services and expenses of the advantage after school program. Such
26 funds are to be available pursuant to a plan prepared by the office

30 existing contractors are not satisfactorily performing as determined
31 by the office of children and family services and/or to award new
32 contracts through a competitive process to community based organiza-

34 For additional services and expenses of the advantage after school
35 program. Such funds are to be available pursuant to a plan prepared
36 by the office of children and family services and approved by the
37 director of the budget to extend or expand current contracts with

39 programs where the existing contractors are not satisfactorily
40 performing as determined by the office of children and family
41 services and/or to award new contracts through a competitive process

44 For the continuation and expansion of a demonstration project to
45 assist individuals and families in moving out of poverty through the
46 pursuit of higher education. Projects shall include intensive, long-

48 The amount appropriated herein shall be made available for one
49 project at an education and work consortium having developed

17 ing administrative expenses, for local
18 social services districts, and for medical
19 care rates for authorized child care agen-

21 Notwithstanding section 40 of the state
22 finance law or any other law to the
23 contrary, all medical assistance appropri-
24 ations made from this account shall remain
25 in full force and effect in accordance, in
26 the aggregate, with the following sched-
27 ule: not more than 48 percent for the
28 period April 1, 2021 to March 31, 2022;
29 and the remaining amount for the period
30 April 1, 2022 to March 31, 2023.

31 Notwithstanding section 40 of the state
32 finance law or any provision of law to the
33 contrary, subject to federal approval,
34 department of health state funds medicaid
35 spending, excluding payments for medical
36 services provided at state facilities
37 operated by the office of mental health,
38 the office for people with developmental
39 disabilities and the office of addiction
40 services and supports and further exclud-
41 ing any payments which are not appropri-
42 ated within the department of health, in
43 the aggregate, for the period April 1,
44 2021 through March 31, 2022, shall not
45 exceed \$23,531,327,000 except as provided
46 below and state share medicaid spending,
47 in the aggregate, for the period April 1,
48 2022 through March 31, 2023, shall not
49 exceed \$25,587,116,000, but in no event
50 shall department of health state funds
51 medicaid spending for the period April 1,
52 2021 through March 31, 2023 exceed
53 \$49,118,443,000. Provided, however, such
54 aggregate limits may be adjusted by the
55 director of the budget to account for any
56 changes in the New York state federal
57 medical assistance percentage amount
58 established pursuant to the federal social
59 security act, increases in provider reven-
60 ues, reductions in local social services
61 district payments for medical assistance
62 administration, minimum wage increases,

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1 and beginning April 1, 2012 the opera-
2 tional costs of the New York state medical
3 indemnity fund, pursuant to chapter 59 of
4 the laws of 2011, and state costs or
5 savings from the essential plan program.
6 Such projections may be adjusted by the
7 director of the budget to account for
8 increased or expedited department of
9 health state funds medicaid expenditures
10 as a result of a natural or other type of
11 disaster, including a governmental decla-
12 ration of emergency.

13 The director of the budget, in consultation
14 with the commissioner of health, shall
15 assess on a monthly basis known and
16 projected medicaid expenditures by cate-
17 gory of service and by geographic region, as
18 defined by the commissioner, incurred both
19 prior to and subsequent to such assessment
20 for each such period, and if the director
21 of the budget determines that such expend-
22 itures are expected to cause medicaid
23 spending for such period to exceed the
24 aggregate limit specified herein for such
25 period, the state medicaid director, in
26 consultation with the director of the
27 budget and the commissioner of health,
28 shall develop a medicaid savings allo-
29 cation adjustment to limit such spending
30 to the aggregate limit specified herein
31 for such period.

32 Such medicaid savings allocation adjustment
33 shall be designed, to reduce the expendi-
34 tures authorized by the appropriations
35 herein in compliance with the following
36 guidelines: (1) reductions shall be made
37 in compliance with applicable federal law,
38 including the provisions of the Patient
39 Protection and Affordable Care Act, Public
40 Law No. 111-148, and the Health Care and
41 Education Reconciliation Act of 2010,
42 Public Law No. 111-152 (collectively
43 "Affordable Care Act") and any subsequent
44 amendments thereto or regulations promul-
45 gated thereunder; (2) reductions shall be
46 made in a manner that complies with the
47 state medicaid plan approved by the feder-
48 al centers for medicare and medicaid
49 services, provided, however, that the
50 commissioner of health is authorized to
51 submit any state plan amendment or seek
52 other federal approval, including waiver
53 authority, to implement the provisions of
54 the medicaid savings allocation adjustment
55 that meets the other criteria set forth
56 herein; (3) reductions shall be made in a
57 manner that maximizes federal financial
58 participation, to the extent practicable,
59 including any federal financial partic-
60 ipation that is available or is reasonably
61 expected to become available, in the
62 discretion of the commissioner, under the

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1 Affordable Care Act; (4) reductions shall
2 be made uniformly among categories of
3 services and geographic regions of the
4 state, to the extent practicable, and
5 shall be made uniformly within a category
6 of service, to the extent practicable,
7 except where the commissioner determines
8 that there are sufficient grounds for
9 non-uniformity, including but not limited
10 to: the extent to which specific catego-
11 ries of services contributed to department
12 of health medicaid state funds spending in
13 excess of the limits specified herein; the
14 need to maintain safety net services in
15 underserved communities; or the potential
16 benefits of pursuing innovative payment
17 models contemplated by the Affordable Care
18 Act, in which case such grounds shall be
19 set forth in the medicaid savings allo-
20 cation adjustment; and (5) reductions
21 shall be made in a manner that does not
22 unnecessarily create administrative
23 burdens to medicaid applicants and recipi-
24 ents or providers.

25 The commissioner shall seek the input of the
26 legislature, as well as organizations
27 representing health care providers,
28 consumers, businesses, workers, health
29 insurers, and others with relevant exper-
30 tise, in developing such medicaid savings
31 allocation adjustment, to the extent that
32 all or part of such adjustment, in the
33 discretion of the commissioner, is likely
34 to have a material impact on the overall
35 medicaid program, particular categories of
36 service or particular geographic regions
37 of the state.

38 (a) The commissioner shall post the medicaid
39 savings allocation adjustment on the
40 department of health's website and shall
41 provide written copies of such adjustment
42 to the chairs of the senate finance and
43 the assembly ways and means committees at
44 least 30 days before the date on which
45 implementation is expected to begin.

46 (b) The commissioner may revise the medicaid
47 savings allocation adjustment subsequent
48 to the provisions of notice and prior to
49 implementation but needs to provide a new
50 notice pursuant to subparagraph (i) of
51 this paragraph only if the commissioner
52 determines, in his or her discretion, that
53 such revisions materially alter the
54 adjustment.

55 Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraphs
56 (a) and (b) of this subdivision, the
57 commissioner need not seek the input
58 described in paragraph (a) of this subdivi-
59 sion or provide notice pursuant to para-
60 graph (b) of this subdivision if, in the
61 discretion of the commissioner, expedited
62 development and implementation of a medi-

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1 caid savings allocation adjustment is
2 necessary due to a public health emergen-
3 cy.

4 For purposes of this section, a public
5 health emergency is defined as: (i) a
6 disaster, natural or otherwise, that
7 significantly increases the immediate need
8 for health care personnel in an area of
9 the state; (ii) an event or condition that
10 creates a widespread risk of exposure to a
11 serious communicable disease, or the
12 potential for such widespread risk of
13 exposure; or (iii) any other event or
14 condition determined by the commissioner
15 to constitute an imminent threat to public
16 health.

17 Nothing in this paragraph shall be deemed to
18 prevent all or part of such medicaid
19 savings allocation adjustment from taking
20 effect retroactively to the extent permit-
21 ted by the federal centers for medicare
22 and medicaid services.

23 In accordance with the medicaid savings
24 allocation adjustment, the commissioner of
25 the department of health shall reduce
26 department of health state funds medicaid
27 spending by the amount of the projected
28 overspending through, actions including,
29 but not limited to modifying or suspending
30 reimbursement methods, including but not
31 limited to all fees, premium levels and
32 rates of payment, notwithstanding any
33 provision of law that sets a specific
34 amount or methodology for any such
35 payments or rates of payment; modifying or
36 discontinuing medicaid program benefits;
37 seeking all necessary federal approvals,
38 including, but not limited to waivers,
39 waiver amendments; and suspending time
40 frames for notice, approval or certif-
41 ication of rate requirements, notwith-
42 standing any provision of law, rule or
43 regulation to the contrary, including but
44 not limited to sections 2807 and 3614 of
45 the public health law, section 18 of chap-
46 ter 2 of the laws of 1988, and 18 NYCRR
47 505.14(h).

48 The department of health shall prepare a
49 monthly report that sets forth: (a) known
50 and projected department of health medi-
51 caid expenditures as described in subdivi-
52 sion (1) of this section, and factors that
53 could result in medicaid disbursements for
54 the relevant state fiscal year to exceed
55 the projected department of health state
56 funds disbursements in the enacted budget
57 financial plan pursuant to subdivision 3
58 of section 23 of the state finance law,
59 including spending increases or decreases
60 due to: enrollment fluctuations, rate
61 changes, utilization changes, MRT invest-
62 ments, and shift of beneficiaries to

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1 managed care; and variations in offline
2 medicaid payments; and (b) the actions
3 taken to implement any medicaid savings
4 allocation adjustment implemented pursuant
5 to subdivision (4) of this section,
6 including information concerning the
7 impact of such actions on each category of
8 service and each geographic region of the
9 state. Each such monthly report shall be
10 provided to the chairs of the senate
11 finance and the assembly ways and means
12 committees and shall be posted on the
13 department of health's website in a timely
14 manner.

15 The money hereby appropriated is to be
16 available for payment of aid heretofore
17 accrued or hereafter accrued to munici-
18 palities, and to providers of medical
19 services pursuant to section 367-b of the
20 social services law, and for payment of
21 state aid to municipalities and to provid-
22 ers of family care where payment systems
23 through the fiscal intermediaries are not
24 operational.

25 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
26 of law to the contrary, funds may be used
27 by the department for outside legal
28 assistance on issues involving the federal
29 government, the conduct of preadmission
30 screening and annual resident reviews
31 required by the state's medicaid program,
32 computer matching with insurance carriers
33 to insure that medicaid is the payer of
34 last resort and activities related to the
35 management of the pharmacy benefit avail-
36 able under the medicaid program.

37 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
38 of law, in lieu of payments authorized by
39 the social services law, or payments of
40 federal funds otherwise due to the local
41 social services districts for programs
42 provided under the federal social security
43 act or the federal food stamp act, funds
44 herein appropriated, in amounts certified
45 by the state commissioner of temporary and
46 disability assistance or the state commis-
47 sioner of health as due from local social
48 services districts each month as their
49 share of payments made pursuant to section
50 367-b of the social services law may be
51 set aside by the state comptroller in an
52 interest-bearing account in order to
53 ensure the orderly and prompt payment of
54 providers under section 367-b of the
55 social services law pursuant to an esti-
56 mate provided by the commissioner of
57 health of each local social services
58 district's share of payments made pursuant
59 to section 367-b of the social services
60 law.

61 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
62 of law, funding made available by these

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1 appropriations shall support direct salary
2 costs and related fringe benefits within
3 the medical assistance program associated
4 with any minimum wage increase that takes
5 effect during the timeframe of these
6 appropriations, pursuant to section 652 of
7 the labor law. Each eligible organization
8 in receipt of funding made available by
9 these appropriations may be required to
10 submit written certification, in such form
11 and at such time the commissioner may
12 prescribe, attesting to the total amount
13 of funds used by the eligible organiza-
14 tion, how such funding will be or was used
15 for purposes eligible under these appro-
16 priations and any other reporting deemed
17 necessary by the commissioner. The amounts
18 appropriated herein may include advances
19 to organizations authorized to receive
20 such funds to accomplish this purpose.

21 Notwithstanding any other provision of law,
22 the money hereby appropriated may be
23 increased or decreased by interchange or
24 transfer, with any appropriation of the
25 department of health and the office of
26 medicaid inspector general and may be
27 increased or decreased by transfer or
28 suballocation between these appropriated
29 amounts and appropriations of the depart-
30 ment of health state purpose account, the
31 office of mental health, office for people
32 with developmental disabilities, the
33 office of addiction services and supports,
34 the department of family assistance office
35 of temporary and disability assistance,
36 the department of corrections and communi-
37 ty supervision, the office of information
38 technology services, the state university
39 of New York, and office of children and
40 family services, the office of medicaid
41 inspector general, and the state office
42 for the aging with the approval of the
43 director of the budget, who shall file
44 such approval with the department of audit
45 and control and copies thereof with the
46 chairman of the senate finance committee
47 and the chairman of the assembly ways and
48 means committee.

49 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
50 of law to the contrary, the moneys hereby
51 appropriated may be used for payments to
52 the centers for medicaid and medicare
53 services for obligations incurred related
54 to the pharmaceutical costs of dually
55 eligible medicare/medicaid beneficiaries
56 participating in the medicare drug benefit
57 authorized by P.L. 108-173.

58 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
59 of law, the moneys hereby appropriated
60 shall not be used for any existing rates,
61 fees, fee schedule, or procedures which
62 may affect the cost of care and services

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1 provided by personal care providers, case
2 managers, health maintenance organiza-
3 tions, out of state medical facilities
4 which provide care and services to resi-
5 dents of the state, providers of transpor-
6 tation services, that are altered,
7 amended, adjusted or otherwise changed by
8 a local social services district unless
9 previously approved by the department of
10 health and the director of the budget.

11 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
12 of law to the contrary, funds shall be
13 made available to the commissioner of the
14 office of mental health or the commission-
15 er of the office of addiction services and
16 supports, in consultation with the commis-
17 sioner of health and approved by the
18 director of the budget, and consistent
19 with appropriations made therefor, to
20 implement allocation adjustment developed
21 by each such commissioner which shall
22 describe mental health or substance use
23 disorder services that should be developed
24 to meet service needs resulting from the
25 reduction of inpatient behavioral health
26 services provided under the medicaid
27 program, by programs licensed pursuant to
28 article 31 or 32 of the mental hygiene
29 law. Such programs may include programs
30 that are licensed pursuant to both article
31 31 of the mental hygiene law and article
32 28 of the public health law, or certified
33 under both article 32 of the mental
34 hygiene law and article 28 of the public
35 health law.

36 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
37 of law, the moneys hereby appropriated may
38 be available for payments associated with
39 the resolution by settlement agreement or
40 judgment of rate appeals and/or litigation
41 where the department of health is a party.

42 Notwithstanding any provision of law to the
43 contrary, the director of the budget, in
44 consultation with the commissioner of
45 health, may use a payment reduction plan
46 to make across-the-board reductions to the
47 department of health state funds medicaid
48 spending by \$467,000,000 for state fiscal
49 year 2021-2022 and \$467,000,000 in state
50 fiscal year 2022-2023 and to limit such
51 spending to the aggregate limit specified
52 herein, or reduce the aggregate limit
53 specified herein to provide a reduction to
54 the state's financial plan. Reductions
55 shall be made in a manner that complies
56 with the state medicaid plan approved by
57 the federal centers for medicare and medi-
58 caid services, provided, however, that the
59 commissioner of health is authorized to
60 submit any state plan amendment or seek
61

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1 other federal approval to implement the
2 provisions of the medicaid payment
3 reduction adjustment.

4 For services and expenses of the medical
5 assistance program including hospital
6 inpatient services and general hospitals
7 that are safety-net providers that evince
8 severe financial distress, pursuant to
9 criteria determined by the commissioner,
10 shall be eligible for awards for amounts
11 appropriated herein, to enable such
12 providers to maintain operations and vital
13 services while establishing long term
14 solutions to achieve sustainable health
15 services.

16 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
17 of law, rule or regulation to the
18 contrary, for the period April 1, 2021
19 through March 31, 2023, for calculating
20 rates of payment to general hospitals
21 pursuant to paragraph (c) of subdivision 8
22 of section 2807-c of the public health
23 law, rates effective on and after April 1,
24 2021, the budgeted capital-related
25 expenses add-on as described above, based
26 on a budget submitted in accordance to
27 paragraph (a) of subdivision 8 of section
28 2807-c of the public health law, shall be
29 reduced by 10% relative to the rate in
30 effect on such date; and the actual
31 capital expenses add-on, based on actual
32 expenses and statistics through
33 appropriate audit procedures in accordance
34 with paragraph (a) of subdivision 8 of
35 section 2807-c of the public health law
36 shall be reduced by 10% relative to the
37 rate in effect on such date. Provided,
38 however, if this chapter appropriates
39 sufficient additional funds to allow,
40 subject to the availability of federal
41 financial participation, the medical
42 assistance program maintain the capital
43 rates of payment and the reconciliation
44 amount provided for in 2807-c of the
45 public health law, then the provisions of
46 this paragraph shall not apply and shall
47 be considered null and void as of March
48 31, 2021.

49 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision
50 of law, including section 2807-w of the
51 public health law, and subject to the
52 availability of federal financial
53 participation, for periods on and after
54 January first, two thousand twenty,
55 through March thirty-first, two thousand
56 twenty-three, all funds available for
57 distribution pursuant to section 2807-k of
58 the public health law shall be reserved
59 and set aside and distributed in
60 accordance with the provisions below. The
61 commissioner of the department of health
62 shall establish methodologies for

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1 determining each facility's relative
2 uncompensated care need amount based on
3 uninsured inpatient and outpatient units
4 of service from the cost reporting year
5 two years prior to the distribution year,
6 multiplied by the applicable medicaid
7 rates in effect January first of the
8 distribution year, as summed and adjusted
9 by a statewide cost adjustment factor and
10 reduced by the sum of all payment amounts
11 collected from such uninsured patients,
12 and as further adjusted by application of
13 a nominal need computation that shall take

15 inpatient share. Annual distributions

54 For services and expenses of the medical
55 assistance program including hospital
56 outpatient and emergency room services.

57 Notwithstanding any provision of law to the
58 contrary, the portion of this appropri-
59 ation covering fiscal year 2021-22 shall
60 supersede and replace any duplicative (i)
61 reappropriation for this item covering
62 fiscal year 2021-22, and (ii) appropri-

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1 ation for this item covering fiscal year
2 2021-22 set forth in chapter 53 of the
3 laws of 2020 (26948) 511,492,000
4 For services and expenses of the medical
5 assistance program including clinic
6 services.
7 Notwithstanding any provision of law to the
8 contrary, the portion of this appropri-
9 ation covering fiscal year 2021-22 shall
10 supersede and replace any duplicative (i)
11 reappropriation for this item covering
12 fiscal year 2021-22, and (ii) appropri-
13 ation for this item covering fiscal year
14 2021-22 set forth in chapter 53 of the

16 For services and expenses of the medical
17 assistance program including nursing home

19 Notwithstanding any provision of law to the
20 contrary, the portion of this appropri-
21 ation covering fiscal year 2021-22 shall
22 supersede and replace any duplicative (i)
23 reappropriation for this item covering
24 fiscal year 2021-22, and (ii) appropri-
25 ation for this item covering fiscal year
26 2021-22 set forth in chapter 53 of the
27 laws of 2020 (26950) 2,170,040,000
28 For services and expenses of the medical
29 assistance program including other long
30 term care services.
31 Notwithstanding section 2807-v, of the
32 public health law and any other provision
33 of law to the contrary, for the period
34 April 1 2021 through March 31, 2023, funds
35 from this appropriation shall not be
36 available to pay more than one hundred
37 seventy million dollars for supporting
38 recruitment and retention of personal care
39 workers in local districts which include a
40 city with a population of one million or
41 more, and further funds from this
42 appropriation shall not be available to
43 pay more than five million six hundred
44 thousand dollars for supporting the
45 recruitment and retention of personal care
46 workers in local districts which shall not
47 include a city with a population of one
48 million or more, and further funds from

22 homeless or have housing insecurity, who
23 cannot be discharged safely to the streets

 42 excluding any payments which are not appropriated within the
 43 department of health, in the aggregate, for the period April 1, 2020
 44 through March 31, 2021, shall not exceed \$23,606,772,000 except as
 45 provided below and state share medicaid spending, in the aggregate,
 46 for the period April 1, 2021 through [March 31,] September 15, 2022,
 47 shall not exceed [\$24,598,493,000] \$23,531,327,000, but in no event
 48 shall department of health state funds medicaid spending for the
 49 period April 1, 2020 through [March 31,] September 15, 2022 exceed
 50 [\$48,205,265,000] \$47,138,099,000. Provided, however, such aggregate
 51 limits may be adjusted by the director of the budget to account for
 52 any changes in the New York state federal medical assistance
 53 percentage amount established pursuant to the federal social
 54 security act, increases in provider revenues, reductions in local
 55 social services district payments for medical assistance
 56 administration, minimum wage increases, and beginning April 1, 2012
 57 the operational costs of the New York state medical indemnity fund,
 58 pursuant to chapter 59 of the laws of 2011, and state costs or
 59 savings from the essential plan program. Such projections may be
 60 adjusted by the director of the budget to account for increased or
 61 expedited department of health state funds medicaid expenditures as

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1 a result of a natural or other type of disaster, including a
2 governmental declaration of emergency.

3 The director of the budget, in consultation with the commissioner of
4 health, shall assess on a monthly basis known and projected medicaid
5 expenditures by category of service and by geographic region, as
6 defined by the commissioner, incurred both prior to and subsequent
7 to such assessment for each such period, and if the director of the
8 budget determines that such expenditures are expected to cause
9 medicaid spending for such period to exceed the aggregate limit
10 specified herein for such period, the state medicaid director, in
11 consultation with the director of the budget and the commissioner of
12 health, shall develop a medicaid savings allocation adjustment to
13 limit such spending to the aggregate limit specified herein for such
14 period.

15 Such medicaid savings allocation adjustment shall be designed, to
16 reduce the expenditures authorized by the appropriations herein in
17 compliance with the following guidelines: (1) reductions shall be
18 made in compliance with applicable federal law, including the
19 provisions of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, Public
20 Law No. 111-148, and the Health Care and Education Reconciliation
21 Act of 2010, Public Law No. 111-152 (collectively "Affordable Care
22 Act") and any subsequent amendments thereto or regulations
23 promulgated thereunder; (2) reductions shall be made in a manner
24 that complies with the state medicaid plan approved by the federal
25 centers for medicare and medicaid services, provided, however, that
26 the commissioner of health is authorized to submit any state plan
27 amendment or seek other federal approval, including waiver
28 authority, to implement the provisions of the medicaid savings
29 allocation adjustment that meets the other criteria set forth
30 herein; (3) reductions shall be made in a manner that maximizes
31 federal financial participation, to the extent practicable,
32 including any federal financial participation that is available or
33 is reasonably expected to become available, in the discretion of the
34 commissioner, under the Affordable Care Act; (4) reductions shall be
35 made uniformly among categories of services and geographic regions
36 of the state, to the extent practicable, and shall be made uniformly
37 within a category of service, to the extent practicable, except
38 where the commissioner determines that there are sufficient grounds
39 for non-uniformity, including but not limited to: the extent to
40 which specific categories of services contributed to department of
41 health medicaid state funds spending in excess of the limits
42 specified herein; the need to maintain safety net services in
43 underserved communities; or the potential benefits of pursuing
44 innovative payment models contemplated by the Affordable Care Act,
45 in which case such grounds shall be set forth in the medicaid
46 savings allocation adjustment; and (5) reductions shall be made in a
47 manner that does not unnecessarily create administrative burdens to
48 medicaid applicants and recipients or providers.

49 The commissioner shall seek the input of the legislature, as well as
50 organizations representing health care providers, consumers,
51 businesses, workers, health insurers, and others with relevant
52 expertise, in developing such medicaid savings allocation
53 adjustment, to the extent that all or part of such adjustment, in
54 the discretion of the commissioner, is likely to have a material
55 impact on the overall medicaid program, particular categories of
56 service or particular geographic regions of the state.

57 (a) The commissioner shall post the medicaid savings allocation
58 adjustment on the department of health's website and shall provide
59 written copies of such adjustment to the chairs of the senate
60 finance and the assembly ways and means committees at least 30 days
61 before the date on which implementation is expected to begin.

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1 (b) The commissioner may revise the medicaid savings allocation
2 adjustment subsequent to the provisions of notice and prior to
3 implementation but needs to provide a new notice pursuant to
4 subparagraph (i) of this paragraph only if the commissioner
5 determines, in his or her discretion, that such revisions materially
6 alter the adjustment.

7 Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraphs (a) and (b) of this
8 subdivision, the commissioner need not seek the input described in
9 paragraph (a) of this subdivision or provide notice pursuant to
10 paragraph (b) of this subdivision if, in the discretion of the
11 commissioner, expedited development and implementation of a medicaid
12 savings allocation adjustment is necessary due to a public health
13 emergency.

14 For purposes of this section, a public health emergency is defined as:

15 (i) a disaster, natural or otherwise, that significantly increases
16 the immediate need for health care personnel in an area of the
17 state; (ii) an event or condition that creates a widespread risk of
18 exposure to a serious communicable disease, or the potential for
19 such widespread risk of exposure; or (iii) any other event or
20 condition determined by the commissioner to constitute an imminent
21 threat to public health.

22 Nothing in this paragraph shall be deemed to prevent all or part of
23 such medicaid savings allocation adjustment from taking effect
24 retroactively to the extent permitted by the federal centers for
25 medicare and medicaid services.

26 In accordance with the medicaid savings allocation adjustment, the
27 commissioner of the department of health shall reduce department of
28 health state funds medicaid spending by the amount of the projected
29 overspending through, actions including, but not limited to
30 modifying or suspending reimbursement methods, including but not
31 limited to all fees, premium levels and rates of payment,
32 notwithstanding any provision of law that sets a specific amount or
33 methodology for any such payments or rates of payment; modifying or
34 discontinuing medicaid program benefits; seeking all necessary
35 federal approvals, including, but not limited to waivers, waiver
36 amendments; and suspending time frames for notice, approval or
37 certification of rate requirements, notwithstanding any provision of
38 law, rule or regulation to the contrary, including but not limited
39 to sections 2807 and 3614 of the public health law, section 18 of
40 chapter 2 of the laws of 1988, and 18 NYCRR 505.14(h).

41 The department of health shall prepare a monthly report that sets
42 forth: (a) known and projected department of health medicaid
43 expenditures as described in subdivision (1) of this section, and
44 factors that could result in medicaid disbursements for the relevant
45 state fiscal year to exceed the projected department of health state
46 funds disbursements in the enacted budget financial plan pursuant to
47 subdivision 3 of section 23 of the state finance law, including
48 spending increases or decreases due to: enrollment fluctuations,
49 rate changes, utilization changes, MRT investments, and shift of
50 beneficiaries to managed care; and variations in offline medicaid
51 payments; and (b) the actions taken to implement any medicaid
52 savings allocation adjustment implemented pursuant to subdivision
53 (4) of this section, including information concerning the impact of
54 such actions on each category of service and each geographic region
55 of the state. Each such monthly report shall be provided to the
56 chairs of the senate finance and the assembly ways and means
57 committees and shall be posted on the department of health's website
58 in a timely manner.

59 The money hereby appropriated is to be available for payment of aid
60 heretofore accrued or hereafter accrued to municipalities, and to
61 providers of medical services pursuant to section 367-b of the
62 social services law, and for payment of state aid to municipalities

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1 and to providers of family care where payment systems through the
2 fiscal intermediaries are not operational.

3 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law to the contrary,
4 funds may be used by the department for outside legal assistance on
5 issues involving the federal government, the conduct of preadmission
6 screening and annual resident reviews required by the state's
7 medicaid program, computer matching with insurance carriers to
8 insure that medicaid is the payer of last resort and activities
9 related to the management of the pharmacy benefit available under
10 the medicaid program.

11 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law, in lieu of payments
12 authorized by the social services law, or payments of federal funds
13 otherwise due to the local social services districts for programs
14 provided under the federal social security act or the federal food
15 stamp act, funds herein appropriated, in amounts certified by the
16 state commissioner of temporary and disability assistance or the
17 state commissioner of health as due from local social services
18 districts each month as their share of payments made pursuant to
19 section 367-b of the social services law may be set aside by the
20 state comptroller in an interest-bearing account in order to ensure
21 the orderly and prompt payment of providers under section 367-b of
22 the social services law pursuant to an estimate provided by the
23 commissioner of health of each local social services district's
24 share of payments made pursuant to section 367-b of the social
25 services law.

26 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law, funding made
27 available by these appropriations shall support direct salary costs
28 and related fringe benefits within the medical assistance program
29 associated with any minimum wage increase that takes effect during
30 the timeframe of these appropriations, pursuant to section 652 of
31 the labor law. Each eligible organization in receipt of funding made
32 available by these appropriations may be required to submit written
33 certification, in such form and at such time the commissioner may
34 prescribe, attesting to the total amount of funds used by the
35 eligible organization, how such funding will be or was used for
36 purposes eligible under these appropriations and any other reporting
37 deemed necessary by the commissioner. The amounts appropriated
38 herein may include advances to organizations authorized to receive
39 such funds to accomplish this purpose.

40 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the money hereby
41 appropriated may be increased or decreased by interchange or
42 transfer, with any appropriation of the department of health and the
43 office of medicaid inspector general and may be increased or
44 decreased by transfer or suballocation between these appropriated
45 amounts and appropriations of the department of health state purpose
46 account, the office of mental health, office for people with
47 developmental disabilities, the office of addiction services and
48 supports, the department of family assistance office of temporary
49 and disability assistance, the department of corrections and
50 community supervision, the office of information technology
51 services, the state university of New York, and office of children
52 and family services, the office of medicaid inspector general, and
53 the state office for the aging with the approval of the director of
54 the budget, who shall file such approval with the department of
55 audit and control and copies thereof with the chairman of the senate
56 finance committee and the chairman of the assembly ways and means
57 committee.

58 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law to the contrary, the
59 moneys hereby appropriated may be used for payments to the centers
60 for medicaid and medicare services for obligations incurred related
61 to the pharmaceutical costs of dually eligible medicare/medicaid

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1 beneficiaries participating in the medicare drug benefit authorized
2 by P.L. 108-173.

3 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law, the moneys hereby
4 appropriated shall not be used for any existing rates, fees, fee
5 schedule, or procedures which may affect the cost of care and
6 services provided by personal care providers, case managers, health
7 maintenance organizations, out of state medical facilities which
8 provide care and services to residents of the state, providers of
9 transportation services, that are altered, amended, adjusted or
10 otherwise changed by a local social services district unless
11 previously approved by the department of health and the director of
12 the budget.

13 Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law to the contrary,
14 funds shall be made available to the commissioner of the office of
15 mental health or the commissioner of the office of addiction
16 services and supports, in consultation with the commissioner of
17 health and approved by the director of the budget, and consistent
18 with appropriations made therefor, to implement allocation
19 adjustment developed by each such commissioner which shall describe
20 mental health or substance use disorder services that should be
21 developed to meet service needs resulting from the reduction of
22 inpatient behavioral health services provided under the medicaid
23 program, by programs licensed pursuant to article 31 or 32 of the
24 mental hygiene law. Such programs may include programs that are
25 licensed pursuant to both article 31 of the mental hygiene law and

33 Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, the director of
34 the budget, in consultation with the commissioner of health, may use
35 a payment reduction plan to make across-the-board reductions to the
36 department of health state funds medicaid spending by \$373,000,000
37 for state fiscal year 2020-2021 and [\$175,000,000] \$467,000,000 in
38 state fiscal year 2021-2022 and to limit such spending to the
39 aggregate limit specified herein, or reduce the aggregate limit
40 specified herein to provide a reduction to the state's financial
41 plan. Reductions shall be made in a manner that complies with the
42 state medicaid plan approved by the federal centers for medicare and
43 medicaid services, provided, however, that the commissioner of
44 health is authorized to submit any state plan amendment or seek
45 other federal approval to implement the provisions of the medicaid

50 criteria determined by the commissioner, shall be eligible for
51 awards for amounts appropriated herein, to enable such providers to
52 maintain operations and vital services while establishing long term
