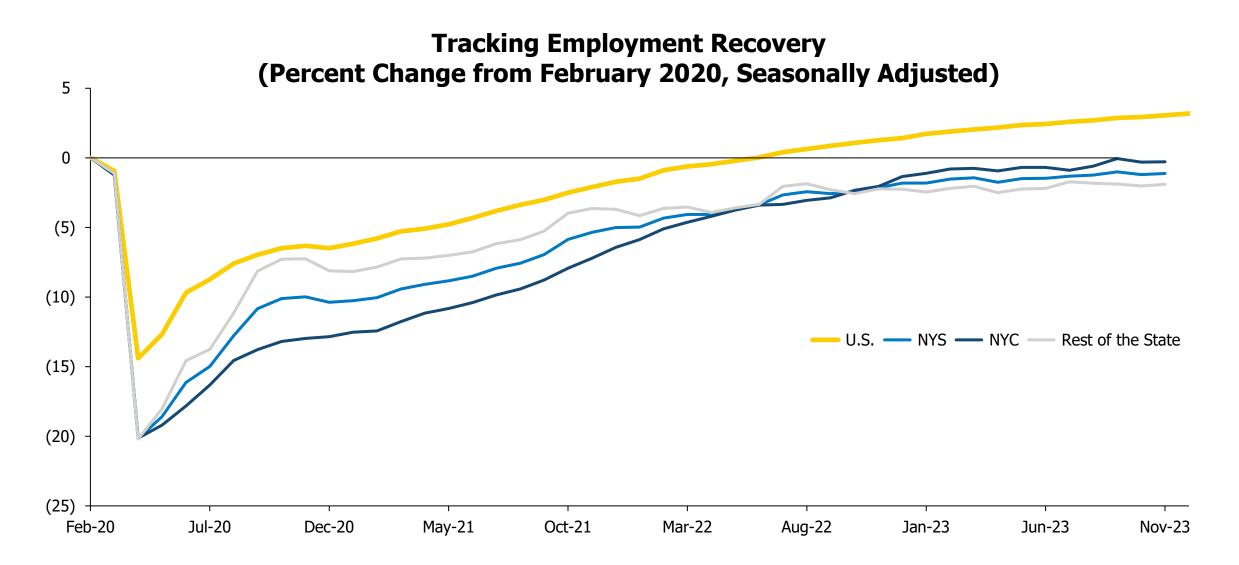

FISCAL OVERVIEW

ECONOMY

- Recession fears have receded
 - Real GDP growth will slow to 1.3 percent in 2024; with growth in the first half of the year below 1 percent.
 - Inflation has declined from its 2022 peak and will slow further to 2.8 percent.
 - Interest rates will take longer to come down as Fed will remain vigilant.
- Job growth has moderated since February 2022
 - Nonfarm employment growth will slow to 0.1 percent year over year in 2024 for NYS, following of 1.8 percent in the prior year. Nationally, the decline in growth will be from 2.3 to 0.9 percent.
 - Unemployment rate will stay in 4-4.5 percent range for US and NYS.
 - Personal income growth is expected to stabilize at roughly 4 percent in coming years.
- Uncertainties and risks still loom
 - Global economy could slow more than expected.
 - Geopolitical shocks could disrupt trade and financial flows.
 - Monetary policy may prevent growth.

REVENUES

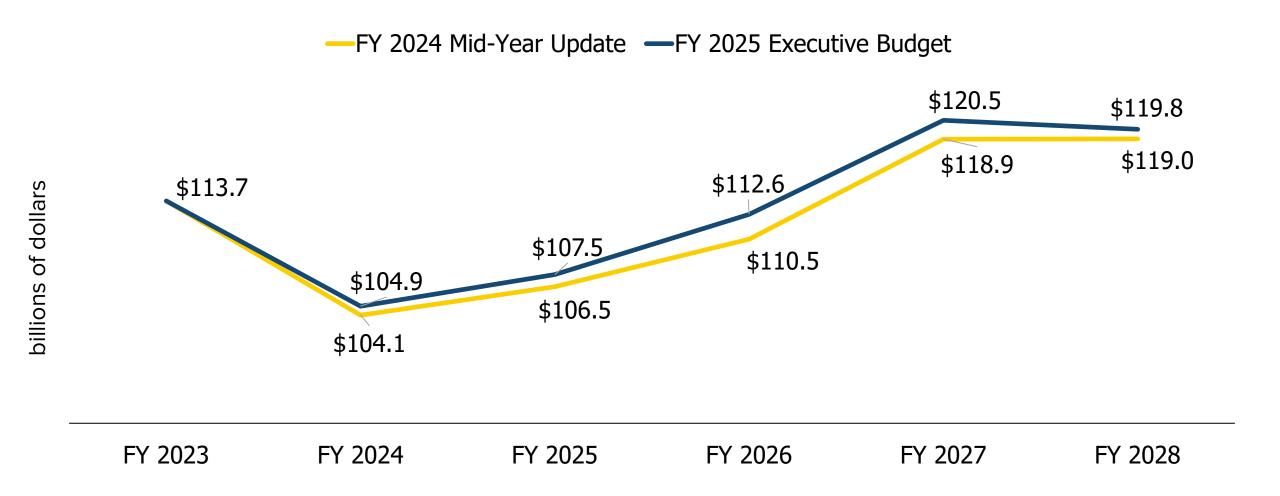
- Growth in withholding and estimated payments will lead to an increase in PIT revenue in FY 2025.
- Consumption and use taxes will grow modestly as growth in consumer spending slows.
- We expect modest growth in business taxes receipts as the rate of economic growth slows.
- Miscellaneous receipts will decrease, driven by declining investment income.

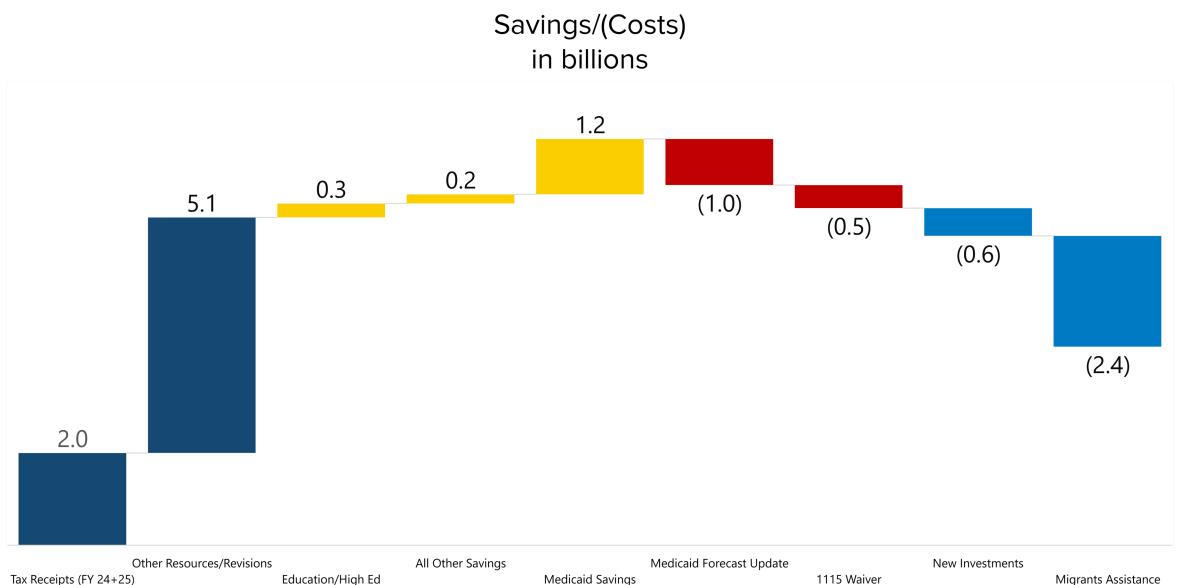

- Our state-only top PIT rate ranks 3rd highest across all states.
- NYS top PIT rate exceeds neighboring states of New Jersey, Connecticut, and Massachusetts.

ALL GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS TAX RECEIPTS (EXCLUDING PTET)

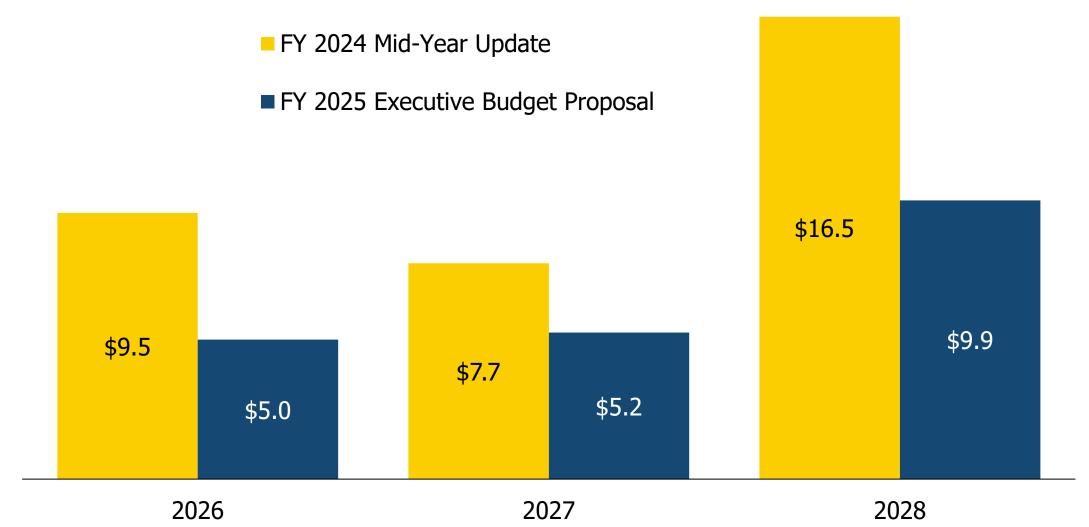


FY 2025 GENERAL FUND - \$4.3 BILLION GAP CLOSING PLAN

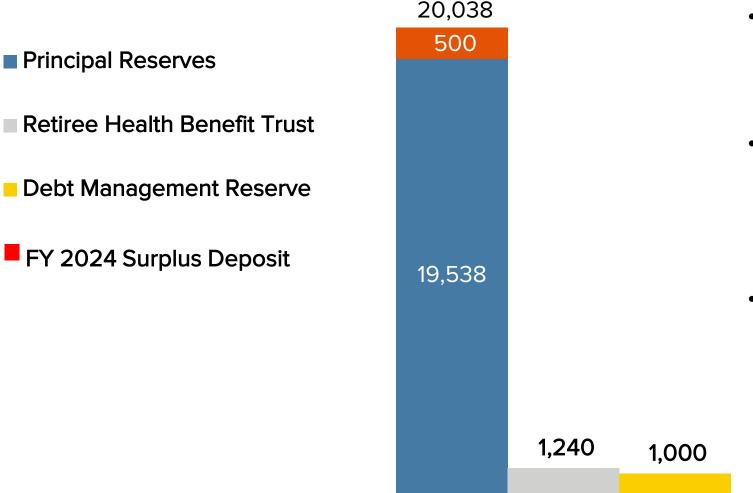


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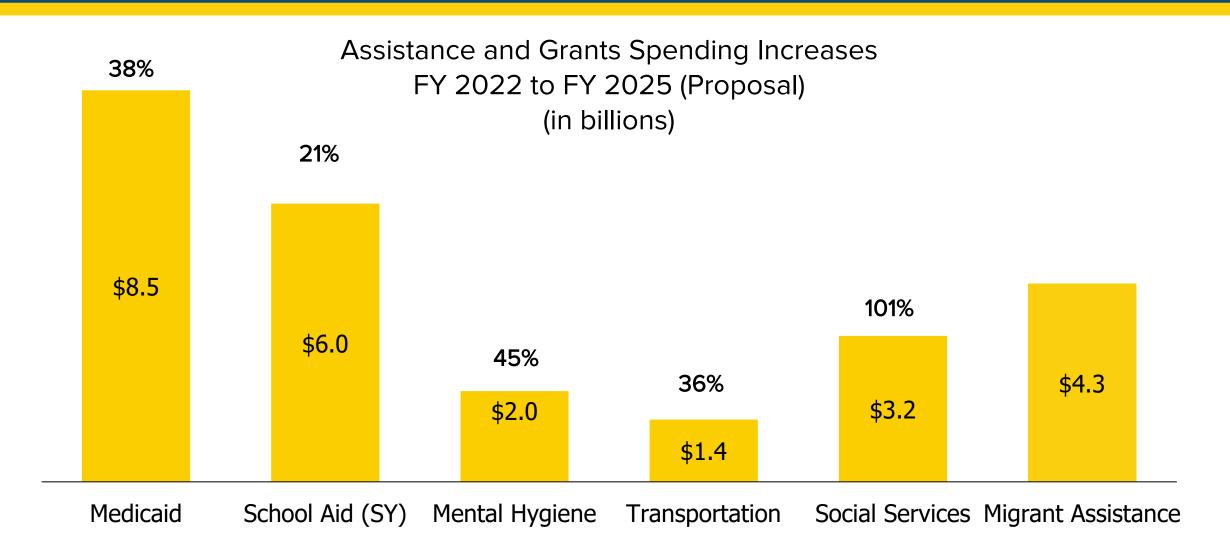


RESERVES TOTAL \$22 BILLION - 5 TIMES THE LEVEL 5 YEARS AGO

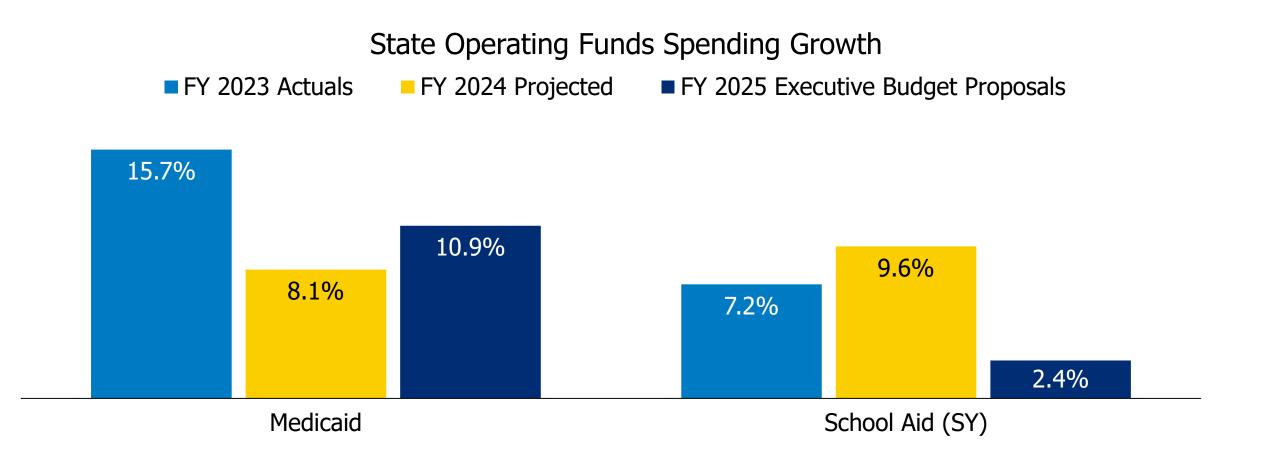


- **Principal Reserves** include the statutory Rainy Day Reserve Funds and the informal Reserve for Economic Uncertainties.
- The **Retiree Health Benefit Trust Fund** (excluded from the General Fund balance) is for health benefits of retired employees and their dependents.
- **Debt Management Reserve** is an informal reserve that can be used for any debt related purpose.

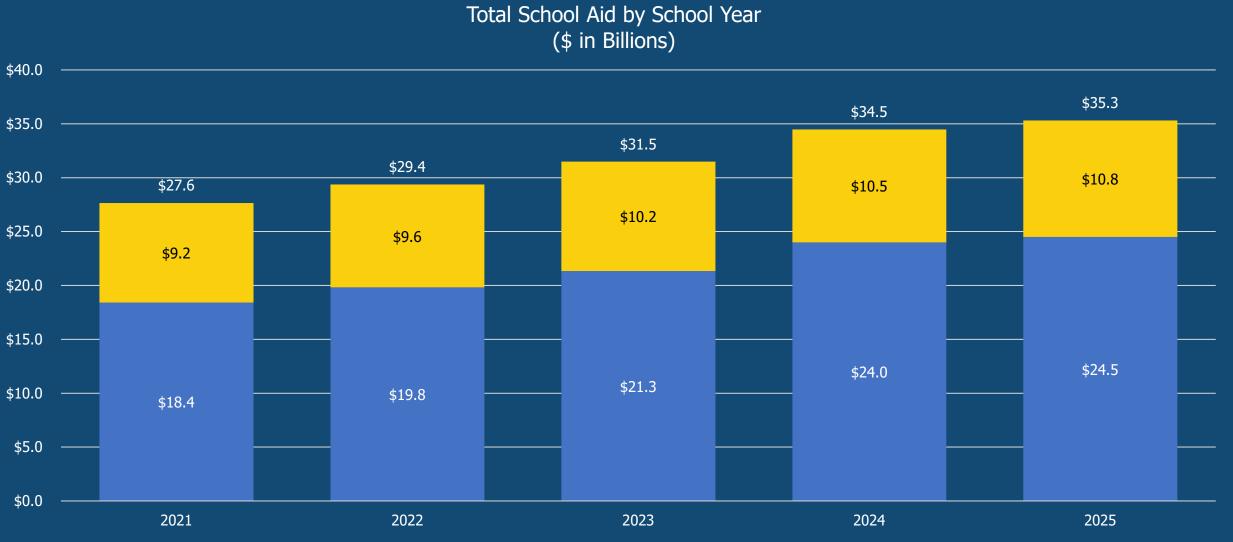

Higher Education State Operating Support, FY 2022 - FY 2025

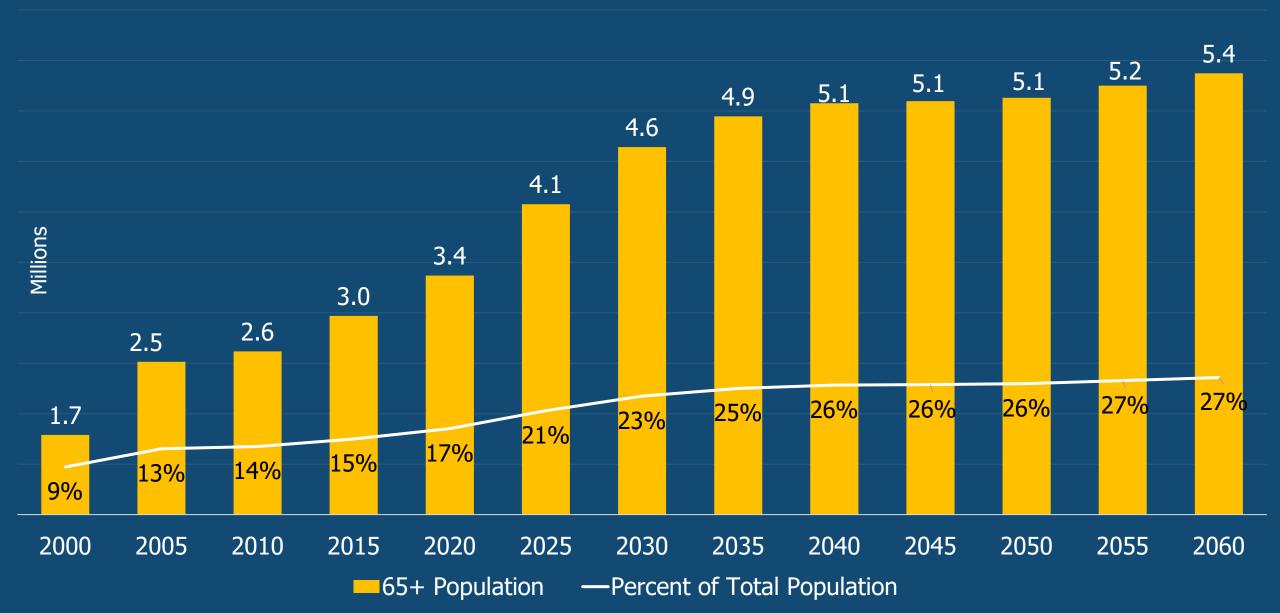

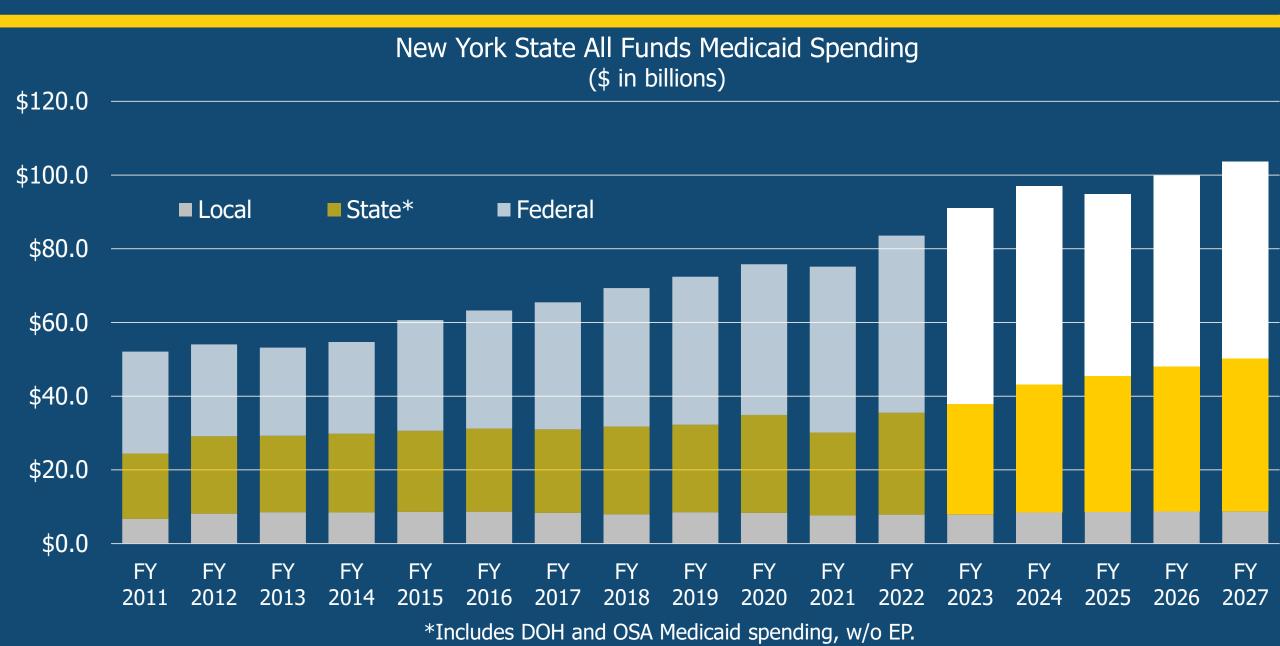
NEW YORK HEALTH EQUITY REFORM (NYHER) 1115 WAIVER

- Recently, the Federal Government approved a \$7.5 billion New York Health Equity Reform (NYHER) 1115 Waiver Amendment that includes nearly \$6 billion of federal funding.
- **Goal:** To advance health equity, reduce health disparities, and support the delivery of social care.
- Focus: To incentivize continued delivery system transformation, improve population health and quality, improve the integration of services, and advance health-related social need (HRSN) services.
- The waiver also includes \$550 million in annual funding to support the transition of distressed providers to a new model of care utilizing global budgeting.
