AID TO LOCALITIES BUDGET

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1

2 Section 1. a) The several amounts specified in this chapter for aid to 3 localities, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to accomplish the 4 purposes designated by the appropriations, are hereby appropriated and 5 authorized to be paid as hereinafter provided, to the respective public 6 officers and for the several purposes specified.

b) Where applicable, appropriations made by this chapter for expenditures from federal grants for aid to localities may be allocated for

9 spending from federal grants for any grant period beginning, during, or 10 prior to, the state fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2025 except as 11 otherwise noted.

12 c) The several amounts named herein, or so much thereof as shall be 13 sufficient to accomplish the purpose designated, being the undisbursed 14 and/or unexpended balances of the prior year's appropriations, are hereby reappropriated from the same funds and made available for the same 15 purposes as the prior year's appropriations, unless herein amended, for 16 the fiscal year beginning April 1, 2025. Certain reappropriations in 17 18 this chapter are shown using abbreviated text, with three leader dots 19 (an ellipsis) followed by three spaces (... ) used to indicate where 20 existing law that is being continued is not shown. However, unless a 21 change is clearly indicated by the use of brackets [ ] for deletions and underscores for additions, the purposes, amounts, funding source and all 22 other aspects pertinent to each item of appropriation shall be as last 23 24 appropriated.

For the purpose of complying with the state finance law, the year, chapter and section of the last act reappropriating a former original appropriation or any part thereof is, unless otherwise indicated, chapter 53, section 1, of the laws of 2024.

d) No moneys appropriated by this chapter shall be available for payment until a certificate of approval has been issued by the director of the budget, who shall file such certificate with the department of audit and control, the chairperson of the senate finance committee and the chairperson of the assembly ways and means committee.

1 e) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, for purposes 2 of any appropriation made by this chapter which authorizes spending in 3 an amount net of refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments, 4 and/or disallowances, "refunds" shall mean funds received to the state resulting from the overpayment of monies, "rebates" shall mean funds 5 received to the state resulting from a return of a full or partial 6 amount previously paid, as for goods or services, serving as a reduction, discount or rebate to the original payment amount, 7 8 "reimbursements" shall mean funds received to the state as repayment in 9 an equivalent amount for goods or services, including but not limited to 10 11 personal service costs, incurred by the state in the first instance being provided to a third party for their benefit and partially or in 12 full financed by such third party, "credit" shall mean monies made 13 available to the state that reduce the amount owed to a third party, 14 15 including but not limited to billing errors, rebates, and prior overpay-16 ments, "repayment" shall mean the return of monies as pay back for expenses incurred, and "disallowance" shall mean monies made available 17 18 to the state that were not allowed or accepted officially by the intended recipient, based on a determination the payment is not accepta-19 20 ble and/or valid. When the office of the state comptroller receives any such refunds, rebates, reimbursements, credits, repayments, and/or disallowances, he or she shall credit the refunded, rebated, reimbursed, 21 22 23 credited, repaid, and disallowed amount back to the original appropri-24 ation and reduce expenditures in the year which such credit is received 25 regardless of the timing of the initial expenditure.

f) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, upon enactment of this chapter of the laws of 2025 containing the aid to localities budget bill for the state fiscal year 2025-2026, all appropriations and reappropriations contained in chapter 53 of the laws of 2024, which would otherwise lapse by operation of law on March 31, 2026 are hereby repealed.

32 g) The appropriations contained in this chapter shall be available for 33 the fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2025 except as otherwise noted.

The office, with the approval of the director of the budget, may reduce a district's block grant allocation by the state share of disallowances or sanctions taken against the district pursuant to the social services law or federal law.

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9 Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the office of children and family services shall impose on social services districts any 10 federal disallowance issued against the state as a result of a 11 federal title IV-E secondary eligibility review regardless of the 12 date the children may have entered foster care, the date the 13 eligibility or payment errors occurred, or the filing date of any 14 federal claims for reimbursement; provided, however, that the state 15 16 shall be responsible for the disallowed costs and expenditures 17 related to the placement of children in a facility operated by the office of children and family services, which shall be determined in 18 the same manner as the disallowed costs and expenditures for social 19 services districts other than the city of New York. Such projections may be adjusted by the director of the budget to account 4 5 for increased or expedited department of health state funds medicaid 6 expenditures as a result of a natural or other type of disaster, 7 including a governmental declaration of emergency. 8 The director of the budget, in consultation with the commissioner of health, shall assess on a quarterly basis known and projected 9 medicaid expenditures by category of service and by geographic 10 region, as defined by the commissioner, incurred both prior to and 11 12 subsequent to such assessment for each such period, and if the 13 director of the budget determines that such expenditures are 14 expected to cause medicaid spending for such period to exceed the aggregate limit specified herein for such period, the state medicaid 15 director, in consultation with the director of the budget and the 16 17 commissioner of health, shall develop a medicaid savings allocation 18 adjustment to limit such spending to the aggregate limit specified 19 herein for such period. 20 Such medicaid savings allocation adjustment shall be designed, to 21 reduce the expenditures authorized by the appropriations herein in 22 compliance with the following guidelines: (1) reductions shall be 23 made in compliance with applicable federal law, including the 24 provisions of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, Public 25 Law No. 111-148, and the Health Care and Education Reconciliation 26 Act of 2010, Public Law No. 111-152 (collectively "Affordable Care 27 Act") and any subsequent amendments thereto or regulations 28 promulgated thereunder; (2) reductions shall be made in a manner 29 that complies with the state medicaid plan approved by the federal 30 centers for medicare and medicaid services, provided, however, that 31 the commissioner of health is authorized to submit any state plan 32 amendment or seek other federal approval, including waiver 33 authority, to implement the provisions of the medicaid savings 34 allocation adjustment that meets the other criteria set forth 35 herein; (3) reductions shall be made in a manner that maximizes 36 financial participation, to the extent practicable, federal 37 including any federal financial participation that is available or 38 is reasonably expected to become available, in the discretion of the 39 commissioner, under the Affordable Care Act; (4) reductions shall be 40 made uniformly among categories of services and geographic regions 41 of the state, to the extent practicable, and shall be made uniformly 42 within a category of service, to the extent practicable, except 43 where the commissioner determines that there are sufficient grounds 44 for non-uniformity, including but not limited to: the extent to 45 which specific categories of services contributed to department of health medicaid state funds spending in excess of the limits 46 47 specified herein; the need to maintain safety net services in 48 underserved communities; or the potential benefits of pursuing 49 innovative payment models contemplated by the Affordable Care Act, 50 in which case such grounds shall be set forth in the medicaid 51 savings allocation adjustment; and (5) reductions shall be made in a 52 manner that does not unnecessarily create administrative burdens to 53 medicaid applicants and recipients or providers. 54 The commissioner shall seek the input of the legislature, as well as organizations representing health care providers, consumers, businesses, workers, health insurers, and others with relevant 55 56 57 expertise, in developing such medicaid savings allocation 58 adjustment, to the extent that all or part of such adjustment, in the discretion of the commissioner, is likely to have a material 59 impact on the overall medicaid program, particular categories of 60 service or particular geographic regions of the state. 61

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(a) The commissioner shall post the medicaid savings allocation 1 2 adjustment on the department of health's website and shall provide 3 written copies of such adjustment to the chairs of the senate 4 finance and the assembly ways and means committees at least 30 days before the date on which implementation is expected to begin. 5 6 (b) The commissioner may revise the medicaid savings allocation adjustment subsequent to the provisions of notice and prior to 7 implementation but needs to provide a new notice pursuant to 8 subparagraph (i) of this paragraph only if the commissioner 9 determines, in his or her discretion, that such revisions materially 10 11 alter the adjustment. 12 Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraphs (a) and (b) of this subdivision, the commissioner need not seek the input described in 13 14 paragraph (a) of this subdivision or provide notice pursuant to paragraph (b) of this subdivision if, in the discretion of the commissioner, expedited development and implementation of a medicaid 15 16 17 savings allocation adjustment is necessary due to a public health 18 emergency. 19 For purposes of this section, a public health emergency is defined as: 20 (i) a disaster, natural or otherwise, that significantly increases 21 the immediate need for health care personnel in an area of the 22 state; (ii) an event or condition that creates a widespread risk of 23 exposure to a serious communicable disease, or the potential for 24 such widespread risk of exposure; or (iii) any other event or 25 condition determined by the commissioner to constitute an imminent 26 threat to public health. 27 Nothing in this paragraph shall be deemed to prevent all or part of 28 such medicaid savings allocation adjustment from taking effect 29 retroactively to the extent permitted by the federal centers for 30 medicare and medicaid services. 31 In accordance with the medicaid savings allocation adjustment, the 32 commissioner of the department of health shall reduce department of 33 health state funds medicaid spending by the amount of the projected 34 including, but not limited to overspending through, actions 35 modifying or suspending reimbursement methods, including but not 36 limited to all fees, premium levels and rates of payment, notwithstanding any provision of law that sets a specific amount or 37 38 methodology for any such payments or rates of payment; modifying or 39 discontinuing medicaid program benefits; seeking all necessary 40 federal approvals, including, but not limited to waivers, waiver 41 amendments; and suspending time frames for notice, approval or 42 certification of rate requirements, notwithstanding any provision of 43 law, rule or regulation to the contrary, including but not limited to sections 2807 and 3614 of the public health law, section 18 of 44 45 chapter 2 of the laws of 1988, and 18 NYCRR 505.14(h). 46 The department of health shall prepare a quarterly report that sets forth: (a) known and projected department of health medicaid 47 48 expenditures as described in subdivision (1) of this section, and 49 factors that could result in medicaid disbursements for the relevant 50 state fiscal year to exceed the projected department of health state 51 funds disbursements in the enacted budget financial plan pursuant to 52 subdivision 3 of section 23 of the state finance law, including 53 spending increases or decreases due to: enrollment fluctuations, rate changes, utilization changes, MRT investments, and shift of beneficiaries to managed care; and variations in offline medicaid 54 55 56 payments; and (b) the actions taken to implement any medicaid 57 savings allocation adjustment implemented pursuant to subdivision 58 (4) of this section, including information concerning the impact of 59 such actions on each category of service and each geographic region 60 of the state. Each such quarterly report shall be provided to the
