



New York State Parks' Economic Impact: New York is open for business – and State Parks are a great place to do business.

- New York State Parks and its visitors support \$1.9 billion in economic activity and 20,000 private sector jobs
- About 40 percent of the impact results from people from outside the community visiting a park, and spending on transportation, lodging, groceries, restaurants, and other shopping
- One-quarter of the people who stay at our campgrounds visit from out-of-state
- We have roughly 100 concession contracts with private business –from resort hotels to snack bars and the Maid of the Mist to kayak rental concessions which generate nearly \$90 million in gross receipts annually
- Parks host major events, such as concerts, festivals and golf tournaments, which provide an economic boost to local economies







NY Works: A Historic Investment

When Governor Cuomo took office, New York's state park system's infrastructure was deteriorating. The agency faced a \$1.1 billion backlog of unfunded capital needs, and 83% of parks were in disrepair.

As part of his historic capital initiative to modernize state infrastructure and spur job creation, Governor Cuomo committed \$89 million to rehabilitate state parks in the New York Works Fund and followed up with an additional \$90 million in the current fiscal year.

NY Works has been transformative for the state park system.

Goal: Revitalizing Niagara Falls State Park



New York State has funded a multiyear, \$25 million commitment to revitalize Niagara Falls State Park.

Three projects valued at \$4.5M are complete (Cave of the Winds Elevators, 3 Sisters Island, & Luna Island).

Three projects valued at \$10M are either under construction or soon will be (Prospect Point / Lower Grove, North Shoreline Trail, Luna Island Bridge, Parking Lots & New Trolleys).

The designs for the remaining projects will be bid in early 2014.













Ganondagan State Historic Site: Seneca Art and Culture Center



The Seneca Art & Culture Center at Ganondagan State Historic Site fulfills a 30-year vision to build a permanent destination dedicated to Seneca and Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) contributions to art, culture and society.

The project is made possible by \$3.9 million from Governor Cuomo's economic development initiatives and contributions from the Seneca Nation, and corporate, foundation, and private funds raised by the Friends of Ganondagan.

Midway State Park: Historic Carousel Renovation








Looking Ahead

The agency has identified 60 architectural and engineering design projects to advance shovel-ready capital improvement projects in nearly 50 parks in future years.

Major Capital Need Projects Include:

- Transformation of flagship parks including Jones Beach, Roberto Clemente and Watkins Glen
- Swimming pool rehabilitation at FDR & Rockland Lake
- Bathhouses at Sunken Meadow and Jones Beach


