- One of the most significant terrorist targets in the Country








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
Federally-Declared Disasters

NYS Federally-Declared Disasters








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NYS Federally-Declared Disasters by Decade

The Office of Fire Prevention and Control is also supported by \$27.1M in Department of Financial Services appropriation authority



DHSES Organizational Structure

DHSES was created in 2010 (through a merger of several State public safety offices and functions) and restructured in 2015. Staff (460) are organized as follows:

- Office of Counter Terrorism
- Office of Emergency Services
- Office of Logistics, Stockpile and State Preparedness Training Center (SPTC)
- Office of Recovery Programs
- Offices of Administration, Finance, Legal, Public Information



Key Counter Terrorism Functions

- Conducting Red Team exercises in the 16
 Counterterrorism Zones to support law
 enforcement programs that encourage citizen
 awareness, facility target hardening, and the
 sharing of the intelligence
- Analyzing and sharing information on the current terrorist threat environment
- Conducting risk and vulnerability assessments of critical infrastructure





Key Emergency Services Functions

- Coordinating emergency management services with Federal partners, State agencies, counties and local governments, including the sharing of emergency resources and developing disaster plans and strategies
- Operating the State Watch Center, which provides 24/7 emergency alert and notification services
- Supporting the development of interoperable and emergency communications systems across the State
- Conducting fire inspections and arson investigations







Key Logistics, Stockpile and SPTC Functions

- Managing nine stockpile locations throughout the State, deploying commodities and resources for State and local emergency operations
- Providing training to State and local first responders at the State Preparedness Training Center in Oneida County
- Managing the Division's facilities (including regional offices) and fleet of vehicles across all offices within the Division.







Key Recovery Functions

- Administering Federal Public Assistance
 (PA), Hazard Mitigation and Individual
 Assistance (IA) disaster recovery programs
- Managing all financial components of Federal disaster recovery programs to reimburse costs for emergency response activities, repairing infrastructure, providing direct assistance to individuals and businesses, and developing mitigation plans, strategies and projects





Federal Grant Funding

- DHSES serves as the State Administrative Agency for several Federal homeland security grant programs and is responsible for awarding and administering nearly \$278 million in grant funding annually.
- The grant funding is critical to support state and local homeland security and preparedness efforts and includes the following:

Major Initiatives



Red Team Exercises

 The FY 17 Enacted Budget included an increase of \$1.3 million to expand the number of Red Team exercises performed annually and ensure that they occur in each of the State's 16 Counter Terrorism Zones.



Homeland Security

- All 16 exercises, which test security measures of businesses and facilities, will be completed in FY 17.
- Information gathered from the exercises will be used to identify common strengths and weaknesses to enhance community outreach and counter terrorism efforts.

NY Responds

Launched in 2015, NY Responds is a state-of-the-art online incident management system used within emergency operations centers to develop and maintain situational awareness and coordinate the sharing of emergency resources across the State



• The NY Responds system is provided to every county in New York at no cost and serves as a single, unified system to ensure transparency, visibility, and accountability of emergency response activities and assets



Emergency Stockpiles

- Nine strategic stockpile locations have been established across the State
- The stockpiles house a variety of resources often needed during a disaster, including generators, light towers, mass care supplies (e.g., cots, blankets), pumps, and numerous other assets often requested during an emergency





Citizen Preparedness Corps Training

- Governor Cuomo's Citizen Preparedness Corps training initiative seeks to provide citizens with the training to prepare for emergencies and disasters, respond, and recover as quickly as possible to pre-disaster conditions
- Training sessions are led by the New York
 National Guard and the Red Cross, working with
 experts from the DHSES Office of Emergency
 Management (OEM) and Office of Fire
 Prevention and Control (OFPC). Trainings are
 conducted all across New York State and to
 date, nearly 140,000 have received training
 through this program






State Preparedness Training Center

State Preparedness Training Center

- Multi-disciplinary first responder training facility operated by DHSES
 - Police
 - Fire
 - EMS
 - Emergency Management
- Uses scenario based training to simulate actual emergencies faced by first responders
- Courses developed by the National Center for Security and Preparedness at SUNY Albany

Located on 44 acres in Montour Falls, Schuyler County, NY







Senator Frederick L. Warder Academy of Fire Science

- The Academy of Fire Science offers courses in many areas including hazardous materials, arson investigation and general fire service training
- The Fire Academy houses a fully operational sprinkler laboratory, a computer room available for analyzing fires or predicting the flow of a hazardous materials plume, a large table-top simulator for command training, confined space simulator, self-contained breathing apparatus training maze, and a three-story burn building
